UPCOMING PROGRAMS

November 26th - Cathy Voortman is thrilled to be DIG's speaker for November and will be discussing the topic of "Chrysanthemums, A Garden's Fall Splendor" Cathy has been an avid gardener for at least 15 years and a lifelong lover of plants, which probably was rooted in her upbringing by her father, an apricot farmer, and her mother, a former biology major with a love of botany. Cathy admittedly has a plant problem (that some call a passion). Despite vowing to scale back due to the demands of her growing family, the problem seems only to grow with the promise of each passing year.

Cathy graduated from UC Davis in 2000 with a B.A. earning her basic plant biology while surrounded by some of the finest greenhouses and arboretums a plant-lover could imagine. She interned at the UC Davis Botanical Conservatory and worked for a few years as a lab manager for the UC Extension's Plant Pathology specialist-doing everything from sweeping floors and pouring petri dishes to assisting grad students with their research on agricultural crop diseases. Cathy also worked a short stint at the Amador Flower Farm--a retail nursery and daylily growing grounds in Plymouth, CA. Much of her gardening knowledge, however, comes from experience in her Brentwood garden where she has lived most of her life.

While most of her free time is now devoted to "all things kid" as she is a full-time housewife of three young daughters, her favorite pastimes include field botany and mycology in both the Sierras and Mojave, growing heirloom tomatoes, exploring Western 4WD backroads and...gardening....of course!

While Cathy has been growing chrysanthemums for only a few years, she has come to appreciate this often overlooked fall gem and learned the proper cultural practices to raise these beautiful additions to your late-fall/early-winter garden. Cathy is enthusiastic to share with you some of the not-so-common mums of yesteryear with the hope that you too may come to better appreciate of them as well. Do not come to this talk expecting to hear about your average Home-Depot mums, rather be prepared to see the crown jew-

els of your fall garden, a colorful display of fall in its full splendor.

this does not mean that nothing will be going on during the holiday break. Plants still need to be watered, turkeys need to be shooed away, general cleanup and preparation for the spring is always a needs for us. If you are interested, contact any of the captains to find out how you can help, especially with the watering.

In the meantime, if you are planning to bring more plant material from your garden, please be aware that the time of year is important for successful propagation. A good example is that we need to propagate Oscularia deltoides in the fall. Spring cutting will not grow as that

PLANT OF THE MONTH

Michaelmas Daisy (Aster amellus)

"The Michaelmas daisy, amongst the dead weeds, Blooms for St. Michael's valorous deeds."



Clusters of old-fashioned double lilac blooms cover this upright, mounding plant early in the season, and eventually appear along horizontally spreading branches as the season progresses. Mass in perennial borders for long-lasting color. An herbaceous perennial.

This tough-as-nails-aster which blooms near St Michael's holiday on September 29th loves sun and is not too picky about water needs.

Loved by honeybees, it lights up in a blanket of blooms in late fall and usually can be found at our plant sale.

THIS MONTH'S RECIPE

Are you tired of having leftovers that you do not know what to do with? Try this!

Thanksgiving Leftovers: Shepherd's Pie

Ingredients:

for 4 servings

2 tablespoons butter

1 cup onion, diced

1 cup carrot, chopped

1 cup peas

1 cup mushrooms

3 cups turkey, cooked, diced

½ teaspoon dried thyme

½ teaspoon dried parsley

¼ teaspoon salt

¼ teaspoon pepper

1 cup gravy

½ cup heavy cream

4 cups mashed potato cooking spray, as needed



Preparation

Preheat the oven to 425°F (220°C).

Melt butter in a large pot. Then add onions and carrots and cook until tender (about 5 minutes on medium heat).

Add in mushrooms and peas. Cook for an additional 2-3 minutes.

Then, add in the turkey, salt, pepper, parsley, and thyme and stir until well-blended. Pour in the gravy and heavy cream, stir, and cook on low heat for 5 minutes.

Transfer to a greased baking dish or ramekins. Top with leftover mashed potatoes.

Mist with nonstick cooking spray. Place on a baking sheet and bake for 10-15 minutes until the potatoes are lightly browned and the filling is bubbly around the edges. (This may get messy, so clean up the edges before serving.)
