#### **Speaker Committee**



Our November 22nd speaker will be Nancy Tackett, President of the American Daffodil Society. Nancy will tell us everything we need to know about Daffodils.

Growing up on a family farm in Southwest Iowa, Nancy could not help but be interested

in plants and animals. She helped her grandmother and mother plant their vegetable and flower gardens, and her father in planting much larger crops. Nancy first experienced daffodils with historic varieties like "King Alfred," which were frequently found at the local farm supply store.

Nancy has a BS in Computer Information Systems and worked with a variety of computers and projects. Her knowledge of technical issues was key to the development of a set of daffodil tools for use on the Internet. The most popular of these is DaffSeek.org which is a cultivar database with photos,



pedigree trees, and information about more than 32,000 daffodils. For this effort, Nancy and her husband Ben, have been honored by being recipients of the Royal Horticultural Society Peter Barr Cup "for doing something good for daffodils"; honorary Vice Presidents of Great Britain's Daffodil Society; Life Memberships to the National Daffodil Society of New Zealand; as well as the Gold and Silver medals from the American Daffodil Society. They have participated in a "Daffodils Species Safari," where they traveled throughout Spain and part of France with the special friends, who are species experts, to document and photograph species varieties.

In addition to being president of the American Daffodil Society, Nancy also serves on the Northern California Daffodil Society Board of Directors. She grows her daffodils in the East Bay on a steep yard in Martinez. Many of her daffodils are grown in pots, especially her collection of miniature daffodils.

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

# Trees need our loving support Saving our trees during a drought by Lori Palmquist

As if on a planetary conveyor belt, another drought is upon us, right on the heels of the last one. California is a dry state, getting dryer and

hotter due to the effects of climate change. Drought is our new normal. We have experienced a measurable state of drought in 16 of the past 21 years. As with the previous drought, we need to manage our lives and our landscapes with an eye toward water conservation.



Lawns are water-guzzlers and are worthy targets for water conservation. A popular response to the water conservation restrictions is to remove


lawns or simply stop watering our lawns. A sad

consequence to turning off the lawn watering is the damage to the trees that were growing where the lawn was. We lost a great many trees due to this action during the previous drought simply because these trees were also being watered by those same lawn sprinklers. The trees were left to find water for themselves and too many of them died. We very much need to prevent this from happening this time around.

What caused that damage? Trees that have lived in lawns are used to frequent and plentiful watering. Since these trees have shallow roots, they will suffer quickly after the water is turned off. Unfortunately, they don't show this stress visibly for a long time. For example, Christmas trees that are harvested and shipped in August will only start turning brown in January. While lawns and flowers are easily replaced, a large tree takes many years to become established. It is important that you keep the trees on your property watered and thriving when you cut back or turn off the irrigation for your lawn or landscape.

#### Life Support for Trees

An online search, "Watering trees during drought UC," will yield great



information and online references to achieve this. Following are a few suggestions for temporary irrigation solutions. Soaker hoses are good emergency tree-watering devices. (Soaker hoses are not recommended long term, as the laser-small holes get clogged by minerals in the water.) To position the soaker hose, start 3/4 of the way out from the trunk to

the outer edge of the tree canopy and lay the hose in a spiral. Mature trees will need the hose farther out from the trunk than young trees.

Tree Ring Irrigation Contraption (TRIC) – The California Center for Urban Horticulture at UC Davis has put together a tutorial for a DIY tree-saving irrigation method, complete with recommended parts and photos showing the drip-ring spirals. https://ccuh.ucdavis.edu/tric. Professional irrigation stores in our county sell these parts. These stores welcome the public as well as landscape professionals.

Hand watering – If you opt to water the trees by hand, refer to the image below to know where to apply the water.

According to Sacramento Tree Foundation's Greenprint: A Regional Urban Forest Initiative, trees clean air and water, reduce storm water runoff and conserve energy. They also improve public health and increase property values.

In conclusion, this tree hugger asks you to embrace the notion that ensuring the ongoing watering and care of our trees needs to be at the top of our drought-action to-do list. For the love of trees, please do your best to make this happen!
