PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As most of you may know we aren't going to be able to have our Annual Plant sale this year. In its place we are going to have a Progressive Garden Tour and Plant Sale on May 20th. This is the weekend after Mother's Day weekend. Members will need to sign up ahead of time and let us know how many people are coming. Guests are welcome to come with members and we are suggesting a \$5 donation for non members. Most plants will be \$4. This is the first time we have done this, so please bear with us as we figure it out.

We will gather at the first location at 10 am for coffee and donuts while we tour the garden. Afterwards, we will select plants to purchase. The quantity will be recorded on your program and the master list. Then off we go the next location where we'll have lemonade and cookies while we tour the garden and donmore plant shopping. At the last location we will have finger



sandwiches before we do our final shopping. When you're ready you will pay for all your plants at this location, by check only. If you buy more plants than you can fit in your vehicle arrangements can be made to hold them at that location until later in the day or the next morning.

Volunteers are needed, but don't worry, you'll get to go along with everyone else, you just may need to leave a location a little early or stay a few minutes longer. We need people to help with set up, moving plants, cookie donations, clean up, etc. If you'd like to help, we'll find something for you to do. We'll need some help the Thursday before the tour, and the Sunday after, as well as the day of the event.

In preparation for the plant sale portion of the day, we have been potting up plants on Saturdays. Watch for emails, as we will only be doing this for a few more weeks. We are currently looking for plants to divide or extra starts you may have and want to share.

TOFFEE CRUNCH COOKIES



cup butter
cup brown sugar
cup granulated sugar
tsp vanilla extract
eggs, beaten in small bowl
½ cups flour
½ tsp salt
¼ tsp baking soda
tsp cornstarch
One (10 oz. bag) toffee candy bits
cup sweetened coconut flakes
cup chopped almonds

Preheat oven to 350°. Cream together butter, sugars and vanilla. Add beaten eggs and mix well. Place flour, salt and baking soda together in small bowl and whisk together. Then slowly add to the moist ingredients and mix thoroughly. Mix in toffee bits, oatmeal, coconut and nuts.

Roll dough into walnut size balls and place on parchment lined baking sheet. Bake for 12 minutes or until golden around edges. Yield: about 5 dozen cookies

*Note: For thicker cookies, freeze dough balls in wax paper lined container covered with lid or aluminum foil several hours or overnight, then bake as directed.

Our April Speaker is Lori Caldwell, aka the "Compost Gal". She is an Alameda County Master Composter, sustainable gardening educator and residential sheet mulch maven. That is to say that she really knows her stuff. Her mission is "To connect people to the soil and all that it provides." She has been happily teaching and transforming yards in the San Francisco Bay Area since 2007.



Lori will tell us the whys and how-to's of worm composting. Worm composting is a great way to recycle food scraps and make a nutrient dense fertilizer for indoor and outdoor gardens. She will also discuss SB 1383, which is about increasing the amount of compost we use and produce in the State of California.

Oaktown Nursery in Berkeley provides a nice selection of potted plants. As a great bonus, the nursery is surrounded by in ground plantings for a nice representation of the mature plants.



Watershed Nursery is on a

space near a water treatment plant in Richmond. Don't mind the odor, the plant inventory was large, well labeled, and worth the visit.

We found lunch nearby in Point Richmond where we dried out a bit. Next we headed to Annie's Annuals and Perennials. As a staple to many people in the Bay Area, Annie's has a huge selection plants in four inch pots. The variety is unmatched by any nursery I have visited. শ 💐 April Showers Bring May Flowers 💥 শ

The expression as we know it today originated in the form of a short poem written by Thomas Tusser. The poem can be found in the April section of a collection of his writings titled, "A Hundred Good Points of Husbandry." "Sweet April showers Do spring May flowers."

Thomas Tusser (c. 1524 – 1580) was an English poet and farmer, best known for his instructional poem *Five Hundred Points of Good Husbandry*, an expanded version of his original title, *A Hundreth Good Pointes of Husbandrie*, first published in 1557. For Tusser the garden was the domain of the housewife, and the 1562 text expands on this theme. It was among the best selling poetry books of the Elizabethan age.
